

What is AAPI Heritage Month?

With violence against Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders (AAPI) on the rise, it's more important than ever to recognize the contributions and struggles of the AAPI members of our community this month. We thank all of you for helping make our AAPI members feel welcome and safe in this difficult year.

A bit of history... AAPI Heritage Month (officially Asian/Pacific American Heritage Month) began as just a single week in 1979, from May 4 to 10. It wasn't until 1992 that Congress permanently established the full month of May as AAPI Heritage Month, to honor the fact that they have "contributed signficantly to the arts, sciences, government, military, commerce, and education in the United States".

How can I get involved? MIT is hosting two events this month for AAPI employees and allies of the AAPI community. These events are organized by MIT's Employee Resource Groups and Human Resources Center for WorkLife and WellBeing.
